In addition they have the sporting activities detailed on the extra-curricular timetable for Year 7.

If teachers have more than 2 classes it is not possible for them to see all of their students. If teachers have 2 classes in the same year group they are encouraged to have shorter appointments so that more students can be seen. It is a good idea to check the appointments that your son/daughter has made before the parents' evening and then you could contact school if you wished to speak with specific members of staff,

Could the school improve its communications with parents/carers?	Feedback has been that some parents/carers have found our newsletters during the pandemic very informative and useful and others have found them too detailed. We are aiming now for communications to be more concise and targeted. The new EduLink communications software should aid this process. We also use the school Facebook page, school website and student email to share important messages and updates. We know how important effective communication is to everyone involved and we are always working to improve in this area.
How does CRGS encourage "reading for pleasure"?	At CRGS, we do a range of things to encourage 'reading for pleasure'. We have student Reading Ambassadors who organise a weekly Book Club, Readathons, World Book Day activities and displays and a termly student newsletter. We also encourage students through the 'Caught Read-Handed' scheme. Students are rewarded with CRH merits, and, at the end of each term, merits will be counted, and students will be given the chance to select a book from the prize 'vending machine' outside the library. This is a positive reinforcement of reading for pleasure in students' own time. Our 'Register and Read' programme allows teachers to model reading in form time and have some lively discussion of vocabulary and the content of the texts. In this time, students will be exposed to fiction and non-fiction texts to encourage reading of a range of genres.
Has the school got an Asthma Policy or procedure and if so, how could I get a copy?	Yes, we have both an Asthma Policy and a procedure. We adhere to the best practice guidelines from Asthma UK and have an asthma register. All students at Main School (who we know to have asthma) have been issued with an asthma card and parents/carers have received additional information.

How does CRGS prepare students for the next stage of their life and future careers?	Students in every year have careers education, information and guidance. Details of this provision are here: <u>Careers and Guidance Clitheroe Royal Grammar School (crgs.org.uk)</u> Students receive a monthly careers bulletin. In addition, we employ a full-time careers adviser who is available to all students (Mrs Howard) as well as a Careers Co-ordinator (Mrs Nester) Find CRGS Careers on Instagram (CRGS Careers), Facebook (Clitheroe Royal Grammar School- Careers), YouTube (CRGS Careers) and Twitter (CRGScareers) too.
Are there sporting opportunities at school as well as those for academic development?	Yes, absolutely. We see our PE and sporting provision as a real strength of our school. You can read more about this on our website in the areas about extra-curricular provision, the News section and through the curriculum plans.
Why has the school decided to have an additional set of examinations for the current Year 11?	This decision was taken to give the students further examination practice and also in case there is a Teacher Assessed Grades process if the formal 2022 examinations are cancelled.
If a child is found to have an e-cigarette or is vaping on site, what is the consequence?	E-cigarettes are prohibited items and must not be brought into school. Students are informed of this on the first day of the school year as part of our Behaviour Expectations presentation and they are reminded at regular intervals via the Student Bulletin. There are also signs around school that reinforce the message. Students who bring vaping material into school, have it in their possession or indeed use an e-cigarette will face a fixed-term suspension from school.
If I want to talk to someone about a particular subject area, what should I do?	We would encourage you to contact the Main School office by telephone or email in the first instance so that we can direct your enquiry to the most suitable person. This may be the Head of Department, a member of the Examinations staff or someone on the senior leadership team.
Is there a system for managing low-level disruption in lessons and if so, what does this involve?	Yes. We have very high behaviour expectations. As part of our Sanctions Pyramid low-level disruption is dealt with swiftly and in a structured way using the C1-3 system. Staff use de-escalation

strategies before moving onto a verbal warning. Should low-level
disruption continue a student is issued with a Penalty Point. Most low
level disruption would not persist beyond this point. However, if it
were to continue the student would be removed from the lesson to
work in a different location with a senior teacher. Additionally,
students would complete a Senior Leadership Team lunchtime
detention. Parents/carers are informed of all C3s by email.
