### **Connect and Communicate Week**

The final week of term has been 'Connect and Communicate' week at Main School. As part of our commitment to an inclusive, diverse, and happy school we hold three main charity events a year based on our CRGS Way and Basics ethos. Earlier in the

year we raised money for 'HARV' during our Active in Body and Mind Week and in the final half-term we will once again have our Serve Others Week. Connect and Communicate Week has raised a whopping £2096.14 for the charity Save the Children.

During Connect and Communicate Week students are encouraged to speak to new people, try new activities and learn more about their peers and their lives outside of CRGS. This is a very prestigious event, and the team was selected to represent CRGS based on their exceptional performances in the Junior and Intermediate Maths Challenges. The team consisted of Akariya C (Y8), Jason C (Y8), David E (Y9), and Nathan W (Y9). They were in contention for winning the whole competition after 3 rounds, having only dropped 2 marks up until that point, but unfortunately the final round, the relay, proved decisive and they finished an admirable 4<sup>th</sup> out of 27 schools, in an extremely strong field. The team displayed some impressive athletic skills during the relay round, alongside their fantastic Maths skills! The winning school will go on to the National Finals in London in June; something to aim for next year perhaps! Well done to all involved, you represented CRGS brilliantly!

### Year 10 Maths Feast

Two teams of year 10 students competed in the Maths Feast at Blackpool this week. The competition consisted of 4 rounds. The team of Karan F, McKenzie F, Emily D, and Hannah H came first!



### **Intermediate Maths Challenge**

114 students from years 9-11 took part in the UKMT Intermediate Maths Challenge at the end of January. This was a 1 hour test for students across the whole country. 23 students were awarded a Gold certificate, 37 achieved a Silver certificate and 32 achieved a Bronze.

The following students had the best results in their year; David E (Yr 9), Muhammad Isa U (Yr 10), Dylan A (Yr 11). 17 students scored highly enough to reach the next stage of the competition, the UKMT Kangaroo. This took place on 20<sup>th</sup> March and we expect to have the results after Easter.

### **Liverpool Maths Challenge**

Students from years 7-13 were invited to take part in the Liverpool Maths Challenge. It is a set of 8 questions that have to be completed over the February half term. Marks are awarded for well explained solutions, just getting the correct answer is not enough. We had some fantastic entries from Eddie C, Hawwa M, Haifa M, Emily M, James W, Abeera A, Michael A, Felicity LC, Jack B, Riley D, David E, Bethany T, Alfie J, Logan H, Yamin Z, Daood H and Rachel V. Hawwa M, Year 8, has been awarded a certificate of Merit, an amazing achievement as there were over 900 entries from years 7 and 8. Davis E, Year 9, has been awarded Highly Commended in the years 9 and 10 category. Again, an amazing achievement as there were over 600 entries. Both students have been invited to Liverpool University for a prize giving evening in May.

### Grow a £1 House Competition - Round 2

We had an incredible week with a range of activities, ranging from over a hundred students competing in the CRGS Games, to the longest queue ever seen for 'Mega Milkshakes', it was a whirlwind of excitement! With bake sales, raffles, 'Flour the Teacher', Classroom Karaoke, tuck shops and so much more, it was a joy to see students from all year groups coming together for a shared purpose. The energy and teamwork was amazing and we can't wait for the final round in the summer term!





### **Student Leadership Team**

We are extremely proud that over 80 students have successfully been appointed to our Student Leadership team. Students will help support younger students as Teaching and Learning Prefects, Peer Mentor Prefects and Sports Prefects. We know they will do a fantastic job!

### **National Reading Champions Quiz**

Two teams made up of Year 7 and 8 students represented CRGS at the National Reading Champions Quiz. The students answered 75 questions over two hours and competed against 17 other teams from various local schools. Izzie, Darcey, Noah, and Holly came 2<sup>nd</sup> and won £80 worth of book vouchers. Myles, Hannah, Georgina, and Zubaydah came 1<sup>st</sup> winning £100 worth of book vouchers and will be heading to London to compete in the national quiz in the summer!

# Exciting School Trips This Term

This term has been packed with enriching and educational trips, here are some highlights:

### Iceland 2025 visit:

During the February half-term break, 26 Year 11 and Year 13 students and 4 members of staff took part in an action -packed trip to Iceland during the break.

Students got to walk on a glacier; visit huge waterfalls; see geysers and hot springs; visit the rift between the Eurasian and North American plates; visit the evacuated town of Grindavík, walk up to and touch icebergs in glacier lagoons; go to a lava show and enjoy a Flyover Iceland experience and much more.

After an early start on the train from Preston they arrived at Euston Station, making their way to the Tate Gallery, stopping for a photoshoot by St Pauls Cathedral. After exploring the wealth of modern art at the Tate, students loved viewing the contemporary and ever-changing artwork in the Leake Street Graffiti Tunnel. Afterwards they headed up to Trafalgar Square where students could sketch in the National Portrait or the National Gallery before heading back on the Tube to catch the 6.30pm train back up to Preston. An excellent day out with our fantastic students offering plenty of opportunity to get inspired!

### Year 10 Work Experiences at James' Places:

Year 10 students visited Holmes Mill for a workplace experience activity as part of our Careers Programme. They were given a presentation about the James' Places group and a tour of the different parts of the Holmes Mill site. Students learned about how the business is working with universities and recruiting graduates into various roles, as well as the many part-time opportunities for young people.



### **Religious Studies trip:**

Year 10 Religious Studies students visited Preston Minster and the Vajravarahi Kadampa Meditation Centre. They gained insight into the beliefs and practices of both religions and had the opportunity to ask questions. At the Minster, they explored its architectural features and learned about its significance. Later, at the Meditation Centre, they listened to engaging Buddhist stories before taking park in a short meditation session.

**Swimming** 28 students attended the Hyndburn and Ribble Valley District Swimming Gala at Accrington Academy. Students took part in both individual and relay events against other schools, with 17 first place medals going to CRGS students across the competition.

They were drawn in a very tough group, as they beat a team in the group who went on to the finals! But luck wasn't on their side on the day and they came away in 5<sup>th</sup> place. The players were disappointed, but the school is extremely proud of their 5<sup>th</sup> place final ranking. The Year 9 team have been crowned both league and tournament champions! All the teams have reached the league finals this year, with the Year 7, 8 and 10 events still to take place.





**Cross Country** A number of CRGS students represented the district at the Lancashire Schools Cross Country Championships. There was some brilliant running in all age groups. The district had a number of runners qualify to represent the county in the next round.


