AQA A Level Drama and Theatre

Course Outline

Component 1: Drama and Theatre

- Knowledge and understanding of drama and theatre
- Study of two set plays
- Analysis and evaluation of the work of live theatre makers

Component 2: Creating Original Drama (Practical)

- Working Notebook and process of creating devised drama
- Performance of devised drama (students may contribute as performer, designer or director)

Component 3: Making Theatre (Practical)

- Performance of scripted extract and Reflective Report
- Practical exploration and interpretation of three extracts each taken from a different play

Assessment

Component 1 is examined by a 3-hour written examination paper which is worth 40% of the A Level. Component 2 is examined by a Non-Examined Assessment, worth 30% and Component 3 is externally examined by AQA and is also worth 30% of the A Level. All three examinations take place in the final year of the A Level course.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q. Is any previous knowledge required to study this subject?

Drama and Theatre is a challenging subject both academically and practically. No previous knowledge of the subject is necessary, but candidates do need to be committed and have a genuine enthusiasm for drama. Self-discipline and the will to extend your knowledge of theatre with further reading and research is essential. Excellent attendance is also mandatory in this subject as students rely on each other for group work, assessment work, etc. throughout the course.

Students should have a minimum of Grade 5 in GCSE English Literature or English Language. Students are required to meet the General Entry Requirement of a minimum of 4 GCSEs at Grade 6 with at least GCSE Grade 4 in English Language and Maths.

Q. What opportunities are there for Extended Learning?

There will be opportunities to visit the theatre throughout the course and also to work with professional actors. There are always opportunities to be involved in school productions.
